Alan Denike has been Principal Bassoon in the Regina Symphony Orchestra and the Regina Symphony Chamber Players since 1974. He holds a Bachelor of Music Degree and a Performer's Certificate in Bassoon Performance from the Eastman School of Music, University of Rochester, New York, He has also earned a Master's Degree in Conducting from the University of Regina in 1989. Mr. Denike has conducted the Regina Symphony Orchestra, Regina Community Orchestra, Regina Summer Stage, the Prairie Pops Orchestra and the University of Regina Concert Band. He has taught at the Saskatchewan Summer School of the Arts, the Courtenay, B.C. Music Camp and at the International Peace Gardens.

Mr. Denike is in demand as a clinician/ adjudicator throughout the province and Western Canada and was the Senior Woodwind Adjudicator for the British Columbia Provincial Music Festival in Victoria in 2004. In 2007, Mr. Denike was awarded the Arts Management Award by the City of Regina's Mayor's Arts and Business Awards.

Association, formed in 1952, supports
two nationally renowned symphony
orchestras: The Intermediate Youth
Orchestra, and The Senior Youth
Orchestra. Through these two orchestras,
the EYO's music program, one of the
finest in Canada, provides the highest
possible standard of orchestral training
and experience to over 150 music
students from age 11 to 24.

The EYO experience has a profound and lasting impact on the lives of EYO "graduates". Some become music teachers, members of professional orchestras, or soloists. All are motivated students sharing a love of music. Our program includes regular weekly rehearsals from September through May, concert performances for each orchestra, weekend workshops, scholarships, and a concerto competition jointly sponsored by the EYO and the Alberta Registered Music Teachers' Association. Players for both orchestras are selected by competitive auditions held each May.

Michael Massey Conductor

Michael Massey has been conductor of the Edmonton Youth Orchestra (EYO) since 1977. He is a pianist with the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra, and widely respected as a soloist, teacher, and accompanist. He appears as a freelance guest conductor, locally and abroad, and has conducted the Philharmonia Orchestra, London, England, the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra, and the Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra.

Michael was inducted to the Edmonton Cultural Hall of Fame at the Salute to Excellence Honour Awards ceremony at the Winspear Centre June 11, 2002, and also received a "Queen's Golden Jubilee Medal" on October 16, 2002, in recognition of his work.

South Saskatchewan Youth Orchestra

The South Saskatchewan Youth Orchestra began in the fall of 1977 as a result of the leadership of Ernest Kassian. As a professor of music at the University of Regina, Kassian received a grant from the Saskatchewan Arts Board in 1976 to travel to Russia and the Ukraine, researching Youth Orchestra activity and gaining valuable experience conducting. Upon his return, Kassian began the SSYO. The Orchestra expanded to 55 members by 1981 when it made its first major trip, travelling to Banff for the Canadian Festival of Youth Orchestras.

The SSYO entered a new era in 1989 when Alan Denike became Conductor and Music Director. Under his direction, the Orchestra has grown from 45 to as many as 80 musicians. He has led the Orchestra to Gold Medal performances in Festivals at Orlando (1991), Montreal (1995), and Chicago (2002). In 2000, the SSYO was selected as the host orchestra for the Aberdeen International Youth Festival in Scotland; in 2004, the SSYO participated in the Canadian Youth Orchestra Festival in Ottawa, and in 2006, the Orchestra iourneved to Vienna, Austria, for the International Youth Music Festival where they earned third place. In 2008, the SSYO was invited to be the host orchestra for the Niagara International Music Festival.
