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The Alberta Registered Music Teachers' Association (ARMTA) is a professional association representing and serving over 400 music teachers across Alberta. With branches in cities throughout Alberta, the ARMTA Edmonton Branch serves the Edmonton and greater area by providing teacher referral services through the Find a Teacher directory on our website, recitals and masterclasses for our students, continuing education for our teachers, the Northern Alberta Concerto Competition (in conjunction with the Edmonton Youth Orchestra), and numerous scholarships and awards for deserving students. The goal of ARMTA is to promote the love and knowledge of music through teaching.

## The Ruins of Athens (Op. 113) Ludwig van Beethoven (1779-1827)

At the end of his first 10 years in Vienna, Beethoven was at the peak of his fame. He was in great demand as a pianist and conductor and composer. His fame was spreading throughout Europe and he might have become a traveling virtuoso pianist except for one factor: he began to lose his hearing. His hearing got progressively worse, yet he never lost faith in himself. In a letter to a friend he wrote, "I will struggle with fate; it shall never drag me down."

The Ruins of Athens is a set of incidental music pieces written to accompany the play of the same name by playwright August von Kotzebue, Beethoven's collaborator, for the dedication of a new theatre in Budapest.



The overture was written in 1811-12 and Beethoven himself described the rarely performed overture as a "little work that can be performed...as a refreshment." Perhaps the best-known music is the *Turkish March*, a theme that even many who are not avid classical music listeners are familiar with. The overture and the Turkish March are often performed separately, but the other pieces of this set are not often heard. The music for The Ruins of Athens was reworked by Richard Strauss in 1924.

## The Lark Ascending Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958)

Soloist: Jacques Forestier, violin

Ralph (pronounced "Rafe") Vaughan Williams is perhaps best known for his work for strings Fantasia on Greensleeves. However, this eminent English composer's catalog of works includes six operas, ballets, film scores, church music, hymn tunes, choral works, symphonies, concerti, and many songs. All of his mature works are informed by his love of




early English music and folksongs. He was a late bloomer as a composer, for he did not find his own voice until his mid-thirties. Perhaps the fact that he came from a well-to-do English family (his great uncle was none other than Charles Darwin) enabled him to mature slowly.

Vaughan Williams wrote this romance for violin and orchestra. The Lark Ascending, in 1914 and revised it after the First World War in 1920. Based on a poem by George Meredith, the work is rhapsodic in mood, allowing the solo violin to soar above a rural English landscape, aware of what lies below, but pursuing its own course ever higher. There is an inevitable air of nostalgia in this work and in other compositions of Vaughan Williams at this period, when, after the horrors of war which he himself had experienced, he tries to return to a pastoral idyll, a peace and serenity that were now destroyed.


## Three Bavarian Dances (Opus 27) Sir Edward Elgar (1857- 1934)

Not until the closing year of the 19<sup>th</sup> century did there arise in England a figure who could be compared in ability to the great composers of other European countries. He was Edward Elgar who inaugurated a musical renaissance in England. He was commissioned by the government to write the music for the Coronation of Edward VII and three years later was knighted for his contributions to English music.

Three Bavarian Dances is an arrangement for orchestra of three of the set of six songs Elgar wrote titled "From the Bavarian Highlands". The original song lyrics were written



The suite was first performed in 1897, conducted by Elgar at a concert at the Crystal Palace. The *Times* reported that Elgar conducted the *Dances* in "first rate style".



Wagner was inspired to write the opera The Flying Dutchman following a stormy sea crossing he made from Riga to London in 1839. He had been influenced by the retelling of the legend from a popular satirical novel, the central theme being the Dutch sea captain who is cursed to sail forever for blasphemy. The Dutchman was redeemed through the love of a faithful woman.

Wagner conducted the premiere in Dresden in 1843. This work shows early attempts at operatic styles that would char-

acterize his later music dramas. In this opera he uses a number of leitmotifs (literally, "leading motifs") associated with the characters and themes. The leitmotifs are all introduced in the overture, which begins with a well-known storm motif before moving onto the Dutchman and other major motifs in the opera. In his original draft Wagner set the action in Scotland, but he changed the location to Norway shortly before the first performance.

Wagner originally wrote the work to be performed without intermission – an example of his efforts to break with tradition – and, while today's opera houses sometimes still follow this directive, it is also (thankfully!) performed in a three-act version.

## **The Richard Eaton Singers**

Founded in 1951 by the late Richard S Eaton, Edmonton's symphonic choir, Richard Eaton Singers (RES), has played a leading role in the cultural community of the city for more than six decades. RES is dedicated to the enjoyment, study and performance of great choral music, to an international standard of excellence, and to fostering the appreciation and future of this music.

RES performances have included Edmonton premieres of many choral masterpieces such as Bach's St John and St Matthew Passions, Beethoven's Missa Solemnis, Mendelssohn's Elijah, Brahms' Ein Deutsches Requiem, Elgar's The Dream of Gerontius, Britten's War Requiem, Walton's Belshazzar's Feast and Vaughan Williams' A Sea Symphony.

RES has commissioned and produced many other world premiere performances by Canadian composers, including Imant Raminsh's *Veni Sancte Spiritus*, Mark Sirett's *In Praise of Music*, Christos Hatzis' *The Sepulcher of Life*, John Estacio's *The Houses Stand Not Far Apart*, Ruth Watson Henderson's *A Song of the Seasons*, Estacio's *branche*, and *Advent Song* by Stephanie Martin.

The choir has exchanged with other choirs, including the Calgary Philharmonic Choir and Vancouver Bach Choir. RES has traveled extensively across Canada, to the Netherlands, Britain, and Germany, and recently travelled across the UK from Edinburgh to Oxford, singing in churches, chapels and cathedrals in half a dozen cities.

As partners with the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra, RES has created many memorable choral events in our city, including the performance of Mahler's *Symphony of a Thousand* to celebrate the opening of the Francis Winspear Centre for Music, Faure's *Requiem*, Hetu's *Symphony No 5*, and many Christmas performances of Handel's *Messiah*.

In recent years RES has joined forces with the Alberta Baroque Ensemble to perform oratorios of Handel, several sacred works of Mozart and Haydn, and Bach's *Passions* and *Mass in B Minor*.

## The Edmonton Youth Orchestra

The Edmonton Youth Orchestra Association, founded in 1952, supports both the nationally renowned Edmonton Senior Orchestra and the Edmonton Intermediate Orchestra. It is widely regarded as one of the finest youth orchestra programs in Canada and gives 150 young musicians from Edmonton and Northern Alberta, the opportunity to develop their orchestral skills, to increase their knowledge and appreciation of music, and to enrich the cultural life of the community through concerts and benefit performances. Edmonton Youth Orchestra members are all motivated students who share a love of music.

# Tom Pinch's Ride — Choral Symphony (World Premiere) Michael Massey

Martin Chuzzlewit is a novel about selfishness and hypocrisy, and the line-up of villains contains some of Dickens' most clearly drawn and loathsome characterizations.

Tom Pinch is the antithesis of these evil characters. He is kind, gentle, simple, trusts everyone, judges no-one, and loves to play the organ. He will not hear a bad word said about his employer, the supercilious Seth Pecksniff, so when he is dismissed by him his world tumbles down around him. He decides to travel for the first time from Salisbury to London to visit his sister and Dickens' wonderful description of the stagecoach journey through the evening, night, and morning is the source of the text for "Tom Pinch's Ride". It is an evocative word painting of the English countryside and I thought it lended itself to a musical setting.

The piece is basically lyrical and frequently in the Lydian mode. I have tried to create a sense of motion at all times (like the stagecoach) with the help of a busy but subtle percussion section.

The Scherzo is a bit of contrapuntal fun, with the mens voices and Baritone soloist having a drinking dialogue while the ladies are trying to learn the tune to "Over the Hills".

Overall I tried to evoke the wonder and exhilaration of Tom Pinch's new and exciting experience.

## **Michael Massey**

**Michael Massey** has been conductor of the EYO since 1977. He is pianist with the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra, and is widely respected as a conductor, soloist, teacher and accompanist.

Michael Massey was born in England and emigrated to Canada in 1957. Mr. Massey's activities as a musician are many and varied. He has performed as a soloist and chamber musician throughout Canada, England, and Scotland, and has performed on numerous occasions on CBC radio and television. As an accompanist he is particularly renowned for having worked with many major performing artists from Canada and abroad. Mr. Massey has appeared frequently as soloist with the Edmonton Symphony Or-



chestra. He has been the orchestral pianist for the ESO for almost forty years and has produced and conducted many Education Concerts for them.

Since 1977, he has been Music Director of the Edmonton Youth Orchestra programme. In 1978, under his tutelage, the programme expanded to include both a senior and intermediate orchestra. The Alumni of the EYO are found in almost every professional Canadian Orchestra and such renowned groups as The Canadian Brass, The St. Lawrence Quartet, The Philadelphia Orchestra and the Boston Symphony. Under his leadership the youth orchestra programme has also produced a whole generation of educated and enthusiastic listeners. The EYO has recorded five compact discs displaying a wide variety of repertoire.

In 2002, for his contribution to the cultural life of Edmonton, he was inducted into the Edmonton Cultural Hall of Fame, as an Artist Builder, and also received the Queen's Golden Jubilee Medal. In October 2016, in recognition of his long service to the Alberta music community, Michael was inducted into the 'Alberta Order of Excellence", the highest honor the Province of Alberta can bestow on a citizen.

## **Jacques Forestier**

Born into a family of musicians, thirteen-year-old Jacques Forestier began playing the violin at the age of two under the instruction of his mother Marie Forestier. Presently, Jacques studies with esteemed teacher Bill Van der Sloot at Mount Royal University in Calgary and is part of their Academy Program for gifted youth.

He has delighted audiences across Canada with his passion for music and love of performing. Jacques has won many awards and scholarships most recently first place at the Alberta Provincial Music Festival in the 12 & under category and first place at the Canadian Music Competition National Finals in Drummondville, Quebec. In June 2016 he made his orchestral debut with the



Edmonton Symphony Orchestra. Jacques was also a featured soloist with the Alberta Baroque Ensemble in February 2017.

Jacques' love of music led him into the world of professional musical theatre in 2014 where he starred as Michael Banks in the Citadel Theatre/ Theatre Calgary co-production of "Mary Poppins". For his part Jacques won the Calgary Theatre Critics Award for best featured actor in a musical. In March 2015, Jacques performed at New York's Carnegie Hall in the Winner's recital of the American Protege International Competition. During the summer of 2016 Jacques studied at the Meadowmount School of Music under the tutelage of Ann Setzer. Jacques has appeared on the CBC Radio Canada Television Show "Virtuose". In April of this year Jacques competed in the prestigious 2018 Menuhin Violin Competition in Geneva, Switzerland – the only Canadian to qualify for this competition.

## Whitney Leigh Sloan

Canadian soprano Whitney Leigh Sloan has been praised for her clear, lyrical voice and ability to take full advantage of both the light and shade in a score (Opera Canada). She is an avid performer with a passion for communicating the narratives of the operatic and concert genres as well as the musical intimacy of art song and small ensembles.

Ms. Sloan completed both her Undergraduate and Master's degrees in Opera Performance at the University of British Columbia (UBC). Roles performed in attendance included Mimí in *La Boheme*, Countess in *Le Nozze di Figaro*, Tatiana in *Eugene Onegin*, Second Lady in *Die Zauberflote* as well as cover studies of Musetta in *La Boheme* and First Lady in *Die Zauberflote*. Additionally, Ms.



Sloan performed the roles of Tatiana in *Eugene Onegin* and Arsamene in *Serse* as a part of the collaboration between UBC and the Meteske Divadlo, Czech Republic. Ms. Sloan received additional training as a participant of the Calgary Opera Young Artist Development Program.

Future engagements for Whitney include her debut in the role of Zerlina (*Don Giovanni*) with Edmonton Opera and the premiere of *Tom Pinch's Ride*, a new work by conductor and composer Michael Massey with the Edmonton Youth Orchestra. Whitney will be featured multiple times in the 2018/19 season with the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra in works by Dvorak (*Rusalka*), Korngold (*Die Tote Stadt*) and Vaughn Williams (*Symphony No. 3*).

## Michael Kurschat


A baritone with vibrant and soothing vocal qualities, Michael's voice holds strong command in the works of Bach, Mozart and beyond. He has been described as having 'poetic bite,' being heard in concert halls across Alberta and Canada. Originally from northern BC, Fort St. John, Michael has always been an active singer in and around his community of St. Albert, Alberta.

As a baritone Michael has studied with Elizabeth Raycroft, Paul Grindlay, Leonard Ratzlaff and Laurie Fagnan and has been heard as a concert soloist in many of Bach's cantatas, St. John Passion, B Minor Mass, Handel's Messiah, Haydn's Creation, Vaughan Williams' Five Mystical Songs, with groups including Da Camera Singers, i Coristi Chamber Choir, Pro Coro Canada, Richard Eaton Singers, Alberta Baroque En-



semble, Kantorei Choir in Calgary and the Kelowna Community Chorus. On several occasions he has been heard on the CBC radio 2 program Choral Concert with Pro Coro Canada. He was recently featured as a soloist with Pro Coro Canada in a Canadian Choral Celebration produced by Soundstreams in Toronto and in Pro Coro Canada's Good Friday at the Winspear concert singing Arvo Pärt's *Passio*. He has been a core member and regular soloist with Pro Coro Canada since 2000 and has established himself as an anchor member. His smooth, powerful voice leads him to be in constant demand as a chorister and soloist.

Michael Kurschat received his Bachelor of Music degree from The King's University College in 2000 a Master of Music degree in choral conducting in 2003 and an After Degree in Education in 2011 from the University of Alberta.
